GUIDE TO CAMPBELL COUNTY VIRGINIA

A Current Sketch of Campbell County



Campbell County, settled in 1736 and incorporated in 1781, is located in Virginia's south central Piedmont region in the foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains. The area is rich in both natural beauty and history. Campbell County was named for General William Campbell, the Revolutionary War hero famous for his leadership in defeating the Tories and Loyalists at the Battle of King's Mountain in the Carolinas.

Scotch-Irish Presbyterians first settled in Campbell County in the late 1730s, forming the Hat Creek community. Other colonies soon followed near Flat Creek/Otter River and Concord, and the County grew quickly during the next few years.

In 1757, John Lynch, son of one of the first Quaker families, initiated a ferry service across the James River, around which the present city of Lynchburg developed. Meanwhile, Lynch's brother, Charles, developed Green Level (now Avoca), located in present day Altavista. Lynchburg was officially created from Campbell County land in 1786. Fifty acres of land donated by Jeremiah Rust in 1784 became the county seat of Rustburg. Brookneal, a busy intersection of trails on the Staunton River, was founded in 1802. Altavista was a town planned in 1907 by a group of businessmen who realized its potential as a strategic railroad location.

In 1792, many years after his famous, "Give me liberty, or give me death!" speech and after his fifth term as governor of Virginia, Patrick Henry moved to Campbell County, first to Long Island, and then to Red Hill Plantation which he called "the garden spot of the world." On June 6, 1799, Henry died and was buried at his beloved Red Hill. Almost 200 years later, Red Hill still holds the appearance and charm of its colonial days.

Tobacco was the basis for the County's early economic system. Because of its location on the Staunton River, Brookneal served as a major tobacco market for many years. In addition to tobacco and other agricultural products, Campbell County has also been supported by manufacturing since its earliest days. Oxford Iron Works (Oxford Furnace) was in operation even prior to the Revolutionary War. The last remaining furnace, shut down in 1875, still stands as a testimony to the County's early manufacturing operation.

Campbell County has grown and changed with the times without losing touch with its earliest roots. As we approach the end of the first decade in the 21st century, the County offers a compelling blend of history, natural beauty, culture and economic opportunity.

Board of Supervisors



Campbell County has a Board of Supervisors/County Administrator form of government. This complies with the Code of Virginia, which dictates that each county in the Commonwealth be governed by a board of supervisors elected by qualified voters. The Campbell County Board of Supervisors is composed of one member from each of its seven electoral districts. Board members are elected for four year terms which are staggered. Elections are held in November of odd numbered years.

The Board of Supervisors serves, by law, as the governing body of the County, charged with administering county functions which include:

- Establishing personnel policies
- Making land use decisions
- Creating growth and development policies
- Setting tax rates
- Setting operational policies
- Reviewing and adopting the County's operational and capital budgets which set spending priorities

The County Administrator is the Board's Agent, responsible for implementing these policies and priorities on a daily basis.

Regularly scheduled meetings of the Board of Supervisors are generally held on the first Tuesday of each month at 6:00 p.m. in the Board of Supervisors Meeting Room, located on the lower level of the Haberer Building (47 Courthouse Lane) in Rustburg. Public hearings, if scheduled, are normally held at 7:00 p.m., following the regular session. Please visit the Campbell County website for information pertaining to public hearings.

When necessary, the Board of Supervisors will hold a work session on the third Tuesday of each month at 6:00 p.m. or other designated hour in the Board Multi-Use Room, located on the basement level of the Haberer Building.

All meetings are open to the public. Any citizen may request time on the agenda by contacting the Clerk of the Board at (434) 332-9525. Such requests, with supportive background materials, must be made in writing two weeks prior to a scheduled meeting.

If the Chairman acts, finds and declares that weather or other conditions are such that it is hazardous for members to attend the regular meeting, the meeting shall be continued to the following Thursday of that week at 6:00 p.m. and all hearings and other matters previously advertised shall be conducted at the continued meeting and no further advertisement is required, per authority of Section 15.2-1416 of the Code of Virginia.



Animal Control

The Animal Care and Control Facility enforces all State and County laws regarding all domestic animals. Three wardens provide services from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. Emergencies are handled on a case-by-case basis during other hours.

All dogs and cats must be vaccinated against rabies, and dogs must be licensed by four months of age. Annual licenses are issued by the County Treasurer's Office for a fee of \$5.00, if the animal is spayed or neutered, and \$10.00 if the animal is intact. A certificate of current rabies inoculation is required before tags can be issued.

Stray domestic animals picked up by the Animal Control Office are taken to the Campbell County Animal Care and Control Facility located behind Yellow Branch Elementary School (242 Dennis Riddle Road, Rustburg, VA 24588). Animals may be adopted through the Campbell County Humane Society. The animal shelter is open to the public Mondays through Fridays from 12:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. and Saturdays from 11:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Campbell County now offers free pet adoption services to local citizens.

The Department of Community Development contains the following offices: Planning, Zoning & Subdivisions, Building Inspections, Real Estate, Environmental Management, GIS & Addressing. This department is also responsible for the comprehensive planning of Campbell County.

The Planning / Zoning & Subdivision Office reviews plans and enforces ordinances intended to protect both individual property rights and the public's interest. This office works to promote the health, safety and general welfare of all present and future residents. It also maintains the subdivision and zoning ordinance and handles rezoning, special use, variance and appeal requests.

The Building Inspections Office is responsible for ensuring the public health, safety and welfare associated with the design, construction and use of buildings.

The Environmental Management Office is responsible for code compliance in the areas of erosion and sediment control, local bio-solids monitoring, flood plain management, and stormwater management.

The GIS (Geographic Information System) & Addressing Office is responsible for maintaining the county's computerized mapping system, digital data, Master Street Addressing Guide, and addressing. New addresses are assigned through this office.

The Real Estate Office is responsible for keeping track of all land ownership and real estate tax assessments for the County.

Construction Permits



Most of the regulatory offices involved in the construction permitting process are located within the Department of Community Development, (434) 332-9596.

The offices cooperate to guide individuals, contractors, and developers through the process. Many projects can receive a combined building and zoning permit with a single fee. Our staff, as well as staff from other affected departments and agencies, jointly review larger projects through the Project Evaluation Committee. The Committee's goals include providing developers consistent and timely feedback on their projects, clearly articulating the requirements for approval, and outlining a schedule for the approval process.

State and Local Codes require permits for almost all construction, alteration and demolition activities, as well as the occupancy of existing buildings for new commercial or institutional uses and special events. Regulations regarding land use changes, land disturbing activities, street naming and numbering, and the subdivision of land are also administered by department staff.

Judicial System

The *Circuit Court of the County of Campbell* is part of the 24th Judicial Circuit Court of Virginia. It is the court of record in the County and has general jurisdiction of all types of cases - civil, equity and criminal. In addition, the Circuit Court is the court to which appeals from the General District Court and the Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court are taken. (434) 332-9517

The *General District Court* decides all criminal offenses involving ordinances, laws and by-laws of the County. The General District Court also handles all misdemeanors under state law, and hears cases in which a person is charged with a traffic offense. It decides civil cases, both in the Small Claims Division up to \$5,000, which cannot have an attorney involved and in the Civil Division, in which the amount in question does not exceed \$25,000. The General District Court also holds preliminary hearings in felony cases to determine whether or not there is sufficient evidence to justify holding a defendant for a grand jury hearing. All cases are heard by a judge. (434) 332-9546

The *Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court* handles cases involving delinquents; juveniles accused of traffic violations; children in need of services or supervision or who have been subjected to abuse or neglect; family or household members who have been subjected to abuse; adults accused of child abuse or neglect; adults involved in matters relative to support, visitation, parentage or custody of children; child abandonment; foster care reviews and approval of entrustment agreements; court ordered rehabilitation and court consent for certain medical treatments. The *Commonwealth's Attorney* represents the citizens of the County in the prosecution of violations of state and local laws. The position is similar to that of the District Attorney in many other states. The Commonwealth's Attorney is a Constitutional Officer elected by the citizens of Campbell County every four years. (434) 332-9520

The *Clerk of the Circuit Court*, a constitutional officer elected every eight years, is responsible for recording the following items: deeds, deeds of trust, mechanics liens, plats and other miscellaneous instruments on the land record books; the Clerk's Office also assists in the docketing of judgments and the filing of financial statements under the Uniform Commercial Code. The Clerk files and processes all law suits including motor vehicle accidents, divorces, injunctions, land partitions, appeals from the General District and Juvenile and Domestic Relations Courts, adoption proceedings and name changes. Other duties include issuance of marriage licenses, processing indictments for both felony and misdemeanor cases; jury scheduling; probating wills; appointing administrators, trustees and guardians; collecting fines and costs for the Circuit Court. The *Sheriff of Campbell County*, a constitutional officer elected every four years, is responsible for law enforcement, maintaining courtroom security at all courts, transporting prisoners and mental patients and serving civil papers in the County. he **Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court Service Unit**, an agency of the Department of Juvenile Justice, provides a full range of services to children and families under the jurisdiction of the Juvenile and Domestic Relations District Court. An intake officer is on call 24 hours a day to handle criminal emergency complaints and can be reached after regular hours by calling the Sheriff's Office Dispatcher at **(434) 332-9533**.

The **Victim / Witness Assistance Program**, operating within the office of the Commonwealth's Attorney, provides assistance to victims and witnesses of crime throughout the criminal justice process to ensure they are treated fairly and compassionately. This program also makes referrals to community services available to crime victims and witnesses. **(434) 332-9613**

The **Department of Corrections - Adult Probation and Parole District 13 office**, Allied Arts Building, 725 Church Street, Lynchburg, prepares background investigations on defendants for the Circuit Court, supervises individuals placed on probation by the courts and offenders who are paroled by the Virginia Parole Board. **(434) 947-6651**

Magistrates issue arrest warrants, search warrants, civil warrants, emergency mental orders, temporary detention orders, emergency protective orders and subpoenas; and admit individuals to bail or commit them to jail. Magistrate services are available 24 hours a day. Magistrates currently handle cases in which the accused is over eighteen years of age (with some exceptions). Law Enforcement

The Campbell County Sheriff's Office provides law enforcement service throughout Campbell County, including the towns of Altavista and Brookneal. The Sheriff's Office is dedicated to protecting the life and property of County residents and to safeguarding each citizen's constitutional rights. It carries out its law enforcement duties based on the mutual respect and shared responsibility of the citizens it serves. The Campbell County Sheriff's Office has attained Accreditation Status from the Virginia Law Enforcement Professional Services Commission. In addition to law enforcement, the Sheriff's Office is responsible for courtroom security, enforcement of county ordinances and service of civil process and criminal warrants.

The Sheriff's Office also provides School Resource Officers in each of the county's schools. These officers are a resource to the faculty and students, and instruct on topics such as drug abuse, laws of Virginia, and safe internet surfing, as well as provide much needed security for local students and educators. The Sheriff's Office is an active member in Central Virginia Crime Stoppers. The Sheriff's Office places particular emphasis on the enforcement of drug and alcohol laws. Citizens and the Sheriff's Office work together in Neighborhood Watch programs in many areas of the County. Businesses in the area can likewise participate in the Business Watch program.

The Sheriff's Office is also a member of Project Lifesaver, which is an innovative rapid response program aiding victims and families from Alzheimer's Disease, and similar disorders, such as Down Syndrome and Autism. Project Lifesaver deploys specially trained teams with the most reliable technology available to locate and return wandering adults and children to their families and care givers.

The **Altavista Police Department** maintains a staff of eleven Police Officers and four full-time dispatchers dedicated to safeguarding each citizen's constitutional rights. The Department enforces all laws and ordinances and maintains a confidential Crime Hot Line. (434) 369-4378; (434) 369-4488

The **Brookneal Police Department** provides law enforcement services in the Town of Brookneal and surrounding areas. The Department patrols the town to prevent and detect violation of state and local laws. Other services include business deposit escort, home security checks and traffic control. (434) 376-2650

The **Virginia State Police**, Division Headquarters in Appomattox, maintains a staff of 11 troopers assigned to Campbell County to enforce statutory laws. (434) 352-7128

The **Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries** is staffed locally by a game warden who enforces state game, hunting, fishing and boating laws in Campbell County. The Department also manages a Striped Bass fish hatchery in Brookneal. (434) 525-7522

The **Virginia Department of Forestry** enforces burning laws which extend from February 15 through April 30. During this time, citizens:

- cannot burn before 4 p.m. if within 300 feet of the woods or dry grass that can carry the fire to the woods.
- must take proper care and precautions to prevent the fire from escaping.
- shall not leave the fire unattended and must totally extinguish the fire before leaving.

The Campbell County Public Library is dedicated to providing the library resources, services and information technology necessary to anticipate and meet the evolving educational, informational and cultural needs of the public it serves.

With a current picture ID, both county residents and non-residents over age 18 can obtain a free Campbell County Library card and gain access to over 300,000 volumes from four branches as well as the Bedford & Lynchburg Public Library Systems, with which Campbell County collaborates. Bedford and Lynchburg library cards are also honored at Campbell libraries. The collection includes children's, young adult and adult books (regular and large print), as well as newspapers, magazines, ebooks, audiobooks, books on cd, and

DVD's. To obtain items not in the collection, patrons can fill out an interlibrary loan form to request materials from another library. The library offers an extensive genealogy collection at the Main Branch in Rustburg, with smaller collections at Brookneal and Altavista. The library also provides adult literacy and ESL services on request.

Throughout the year, free educational and entertaining programs for children, families, and adults, such as a story time and summer reading program for children, book clubs for children and adults, and seasonal events for all ages are offered. Job search, resume, basic software applications and technology assistance is also available by appointment.

NLM = National Historic Landmark, N = National Register of

1. *Staunton (Roanoke) River* - Scenic and historic river.
2. *Kanawa Canal* - Former primary source of commerce and transportation in Central Virginia.
3. *Brookneal* - Chartered in 1802 after John Brooke built a warehouse near the boat landing and ferry crossing on the Staunton River.
4. *Long Mountain* - Provides a scenic view of the surrounding area and an environment suitable for hunting and trail riding.
5. *Johnson's Mountain* - Provides a picturesque view.
6. *Rustburg* - Established as the county seat in 1784 on 50 acres of land donated by Jeremiah Rust. The Historic Courthouse (1848) and other historic buildings stand in the Courthouse Square.
7. *Candler's Mountain* - Natural condition and scenic view.
8. *Hat Creek* - Established around 1736 as the earliest settlement in Campbell County.
9. *Lynch Tree* - Old walnut tree under which Colonel Charles Lynch and others held informal court for Tories and criminals.
10. *Altavista* - First planned community in the County. Founded in 1907 and incorporated in 1912.
11. *Shady Grove (N/V)* - Built on property inherited by Patrick Henry's son, Spotswood Henry.
12. *Plantation Gardens* - Gardens built in 1790, dominated by American and English boxwoods which are estimated to be 150-180 years old.
13. *Leesville* - A center of trade before the American Revolution.
14. *Leesville Lake* - Lake providing hydroelectric power and various recreational activities.
15. *Evington* - One of the oldest settlements in the County, the site of a mill and a tavern that served as a traveler's rest.
16. *Gladys* - Once called Pigeon Run after the flocks of now extinct passenger pigeons that roosted in the area.
17. *Naruna* - An early trade center and mail stop given an Indian name.
18. *Concord* - Third earliest settlement in the County.
19. *New London* - County seat of Bedford county before the formation of Campbell County. Site of a Revolutionary War arsenal and one of Patrick Henry's most famous court cases.
20. *Red Hill (NLM)* - Last home and burial place of Patrick Henry. Shrine is located just inside of Charlotte County; adjacent to Patrick Henry Boys Plantation which is located in Campbell County.
21. *Long Island* - Village started in 1907. Site hosts a recreation park and boat landing.
22. *White Hall* - Plantation built in 1810 by John S. Payne containing two original native stone servants' quarters.
23. *Blenheim (N/V)* - House built on the Falling River before 1782.
24. *Cat Rock Sluice (N/V)* - Part of the Roanoke Navigational Canal.
25. *Avoca (N/V)* - The Altavista home site of Revolutionary War Patriot Colonel Charles Lynch. House tours available. (434) 369-1076
26. *Green Hill (N/V)* - Home built by Samuel Pannill in 1797.
27. *Federal Hill (N/V)* - Home built prior to 1880 by James Steptoe.
28. *Mount Athos (N/V)* - Includes the Robertson family and the Mt. Athos slave cemeteries.
29. *Six Mile Bridge* - Bridge spanning the James River; since converted to a railroad bridge.
30. *Timberlake* - Dam washed away in 1995; since rebuilt and refilled.
31. *Oxford Furnace* - Pre-Civil War iron furnace.

Dog Tags

Licenses are required for all dogs at least four months of age and must be renewed annually. They may be obtained at the County Treasurer's Office for \$5.00, if the animal is sterilized; \$10.00 if the animal is intact. A current rabies certificate is required before tags can be issued. A group of dogs in a kennel may be licensed together for \$20.00 for up to 20 dogs, or \$30.00 for up to 50 dogs. Duplicate tags cost \$1.00 each.

Marriage

Marriage licenses are issued by the office of the Clerk of the Circuit Court. Both parties must be 18 years of age. If between 16 and 18 years of age, an applicant must be accompanied by a parent and must furnish a birth certificate. If divorced, a party must have a certified copy of the divorce decree. Both parties must be present. The fee is \$30.00 for a marriage license which is valid for 60 days.

Vehicles

On January 1, 2006, Campbell County implemented a licensing program which discontinued the use of a windshield decal on licensed vehicles. The license fee for cars and trucks is \$27.00, is included in personal property bills each Fall, and is assessed on vehicles owned as of January 1st of the current tax year. If a resident purchases another vehicle during the course of the year, it will not be assessed an additional license fee. All vehicles will be assessed the license fee, whether they are operable or not, unless otherwise exempted by County or State code.

Public Safety

The Campbell County Department of Public Safety serves to provide animal control, emergency medical services, fire suppression, fire prevention, emergency management and preparedness, and E-911 services to the general public. The department consists of five divisions - Emergency Planning, Communications, Fire, EMS, and Animal Control. The department is administered by a public safety director using an integrated “all-hazards” emergency management approach.

The Department of Public Safety supports and sponsors a variety of community education and awareness programs to enhance the public’s understanding of available services and activities relating to emergency planning, preparedness and prevention.

Emergency services are provided on a 24-hour basis by a volunteer fire, and a combination emergency medical services (EMS) system utilizing career and volunteer emergency medical providers. Campbell County is fortunate to be served by a strong volunteer contingent existing of three volunteer fire departments, and three volunteer rescue squads. The department also provides the services of a full time fire marshal’s office to manage fire inspections and investigations.

An enhanced 9-1-1 emergency communications system allows computer tracking of citizen calls and assists in accurate dispatching and response of fire, rescue and law enforcement agencies. Under the E-911 system, all roads are named and all structures are assigned a number on roads with three or more habitable dwellings. The E-911 system also allows for the utilization of emergency medical dispatching (EMD), where a communications officer may provide basic medical instructions to a 911 caller in order to assist a sick and/or injured person.

Real Estate

The Real Estate Office is responsible for producing the Land Book each year and for keeping track of all land ownership and real estate assessments for the County. The annual Land Book is required by state code to show: Map ID, Name of Owner, Mailing Address, Situs Address, Legal Description, Deed Reference, Size, Land Value, Building Value and Total Value. The office assesses all new construction and new subdivisions yearly and maintains records of land ownership transfers and the parcel layer of the GIS maps. Additionally, this office also assists citizens in locating specific addresses and determining ownership of property.

The Real Estate Office conducts general reassessments for the County. The reassessment cycle occurs at the minimum of every 4 years. The latest general reassessment took effect January 1, 2015 and the next one will be effective January 1, 2019. State law requires that all property be assessed at 100% of fair market value and must have equity throughout the County.

Over 1,000 teachers, librarians, guidance personnel, special education instructors and support staff work jointly to meet the needs of all students. Approximately 43% of County teachers hold Master's degrees. Statistics indicate that the student/teacher ratios for the County are on the average of 21 to 1 at the elementary level and 20 to 1 at the secondary level.

The Department of Social Services provides social work services, financial services and volunteer opportunities administered according to state and federal regulations. The mission of the Department is to promote self-reliance and provide protection for Virginians through community-based services.

Financial services have differing eligibility guidelines and require completion of applications and verification of information. Programs are designed to assist low-income families or individuals through cash grants or in-kind payments to meet financial needs.

Tax Information



he office of the Commissioner of the Revenue is responsible for assessing personal and real property in accordance with the Code of Virginia and local ordinances. Local personal and real property tax rates are set annually by the Board of Supervisors.

Personal property items taxable to individuals include motor vehicles, boats, boat trailers, utility trailers, campers, aircraft, and mobile homes. Personal property items taxable to a business include vehicles, furniture and fixtures, machinery and tools, and other tangible personal property used in the business.

Campbell County does not prorate personal property tax. Residents are assessed for an entire year on personal property owned and having a Campbell County situs on January 1. Personal property acquired after January 1 is not assessed until the following year.

Campbell County performs a comprehensive mass appraisal of real property every four years. New construction is appraised every year. Campbell County offers a Land Use Program and real estate Tax Relief Program for the Elderly and Disabled which are administered by the office of the Commissioner of the Revenue. Real estate and personal property taxes are due December 5.

The Commissioner of the Revenue is on-line with the Department of Motor Vehicles and the Department of Taxation. State income tax returns that are filed locally receive the benefit of an in-house review which, in many cases, leads to a larger tax refund or a lower tax liability. Tax returns filed with the Commissioner's Office receive electronic processing, resulting in a faster refund.

The Town of Altavista, with a population of approximately 3,400, is located in the southwestern part of Campbell County, approximately 20 miles south of Lynchburg on U. S. Highway 29. Our business community offers a full range of retail and service firms and a diversified manufacturing segment. A non-profit facility, the Sheltered Workshop, offers special employment opportunities for the handicapped. Motel and bed and breakfast accommodations are available for overnight guests. The town has a volunteer fire department, a volunteer EMS squad, three physicians and four dentists.

Altavista is governed by a seven member Town Council, and its daily operations are guided by a Town Manager. Office hours are 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday-Friday. The town provides water, sewer, law enforcement and garbage collection services to its residents. Our students are served by one elementary school (pupil/teacher ratio: 17:1) and one combined middle/high school (pupil/teacher ratio : 16:1).

Altavista also has a variety of recreational and tourist attractions. There are 61 acres of local park land in Altavista with facilities including English Park, Shreve Park, a boat launch, fishing piers, walking paths, baseball fields, basketball courts, picnic areas and playgrounds. Other recreation choices are available at a local golf course and a YMCA. The YMCA provides a full complement of facilities as well as all-day care for children. Those interested in history will enjoy Altavista's museum, Avoca, located at 1514 Main Street. A decorated Victorian Queen Anne style house, Avoca contains Civil War memorabilia and Native American artifacts. It is the home site of Revolutionary War patriot Colonel Charles Lynch. The museum and the growing economy are two examples of the way in which Altavista is living up to its town mission statement, "A progressive community of excellence, second to none, committed to providing the best place to live, work, worship, and grow. At all times we will serve the best interests of all citizens. All citizens are challenged to proactive involvement in doing their parts to accomplish our mission."

The Town of Brookneal is located on US Route 501 in southeastern Campbell County and has since its founding in 1802 served as a center of commerce for the surrounding areas in Campbell, Charlotte and Halifax counties.

Brookneal is an incorporated town with a population of approximately 1,250 and serving approximately 40,000 in the immediate area. The thriving economy includes a diversified manufacturing base, agriculture, service firms and retail offerings.

Brookneal is a full service town with comprehensive planning, zoning, water and sewer, sanitation service and police. Fire and Rescue services are provided by the Brookneal Volunteer Fire Department and the Brookneal Volunteer Rescue Squad. Public Safety dispatch and coordination of police coverage is provided through integration into the county's E-911 system. The town is an active participant in regional economic development, planning and government organizations.

Excellent recreational opportunities abound in the area. Public facilities include a large recreation park, a boat ramp on the Staunton River and a historic community center. The Brookneal Recreation park offers baseball and softball fields, picnic areas, tennis courts, a playground and a hiking trail. The Campbell County Utilities and Service Authority (the "Authority" or "CCUSA") was established by resolution of the Campbell County Board of Supervisors and chartered by the Commonwealth of Virginia State Corporation Commission to provide water and sewer services to County residents as permitted under the Code of Virginia.

Under the Enabling Act of 1950, the Authority is authorized to:

- acquire, construct, improve, operate and maintain any water system or sewage disposal system;
- issue revenue bonds of the Authority payable solely from revenues to pay all or any part of the cost of water system or sewage disposal system;
- repair, revise, charge and collect rates, fees and charges for the use of and for the services furnished by any system operated by the Authority;
- enter into contracts with any unit, including counties, cities and authorities, relating to the furnishing of services of any water system or sewage disposal system of the Authority

Additionally, the Authority is subject in all respects to the jurisdiction of the Virginia State Water Control Board pursuant to the provisions of the State Water Control Law.

The Campbell County Unit of Virginia Cooperative Extension is the public service and outreach program of Virginia Tech and Virginia State University. It is the local contact for citizens to obtain objective research-based information on a variety of topics. Typical topics relate to the fields of agriculture, homemaking skills and consumerism, 4-H youth activities and youth leadership development. Local concerns and issues are addressed through workshops, seminars, individual consultations and organized groups such as agricultural commodity groups, family and homemaking groups and 4-H clubs.

Voter Registration & Voting

Voter registration is available to any Virginia resident who will be eighteen years of age or older by the next General Election. A voter registration application can be obtained at the Office of the General Registrar, in person or by calling for an application which can be sent and returned by mail, or by any of the following methods: at any DMV; public library; or social service agency in Virginia. An application can also be downloaded from the State Board of Elections website at: www.sbe.virginia.gov.

If moving within the County or to another county or city within the Commonwealth, the same procedure may be followed.

Properly registered voters may vote by absentee ballot if they will be out of the County on election day or if they are unable to go to the polls due to physical illness or disability. An absentee precinct, where absentee ballots are counted, is located in the Registrar Building in Rustburg.

The General Registrar's office is a permanent location for voter registration, in-person absentee voting, obtaining information on candidates and referenda and other voting related information. The Registrar is responsible for voter registration; all candidate filings and the maintenance of these records; providing all precincts with adequate facilities to vote and training of election officials to work the polls; recording and reporting the results of elections. The Office of the General Registrar is open 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. weekdays and certain Saturdays prior to each election.

Waste Management & Recycling



Campbell County currently operates eight rural transfer sites at which all County citizens (including the residents of Brookneal and Altavista) may deposit household waste at no charge. Large, bulky items, such as appliances, mattresses and furniture, tires, televisions, and brush must be brought to either the Campbell County Landfill Center or the Regional Landfill for disposal.

Recycling

Campbell County encourages citizens to recycle or consider donating certain materials (clothing, household items and toys) to local charitable organizations when possible. For citizens' convenience, receptacles are located at the Landfill Center for the following recyclables: newspaper, mixed papers, aluminum and bi-metal cans.

Household and Hazardous Waste Collection and E-Recycling

The Region 2000 Services Authority hosts three collection days a year at the Regional Landfill from 8:00 a.m. to noon for household hazardous waste (HHW) and electronic recycling. These are held on the second Saturday of April, June and October. All Lynchburg City, Amherst, Appomattox, Campbell (including the Towns of Altavista & Brookneal) and Nelson County residents can participate. The Campbell County Department of Youth Services manages various services related to youth needs. The following programs are the foundation of Youth Services.

The main goal of the *Children's Services Act (CSA)* is to provide high quality, child centered, family focused, cost effective, community-based services to high-risk youth and their families. State and local agencies, parents and private service providers work together to plan and provide needed services.

The *Virginia Juvenile Community Crime Control Act (VJCCCA)* was formed to establish a community-based system of progressive intensive sanctions and services, which correspond to the severity of offense and treatment needs of youthful offenders. The purpose is to deter crime by providing immediate, effective punishment, which emphasizes accountability of the juvenile offender for his/her actions as well as reduces the pattern of repeat offending. Local funds are used for outreach detention programs, shelter care placements, parent coaching and community service assignments.
